Last year we launched our new strategic direction which aims to be flexible and mouldable to ensure we meet the needs of students. The 2024-29 strategy document was developed by engaging directly with students to understand your expectations and priorities for the Students' Union in the years ahead.

The strategy is much more adaptive in its approach, allowing UUSU to be where students need us to be, whenever this is, however, will continue to build on the core pillars of UUSU that centre around representation, connectivity, and support.

UUSU continues to ensure we can represent our student community effectively and have increased our visibility and opportunities to engage across the campuses this last year. We are committed to students finding us on their normal campus journeys as opposed to having to seek us out for support. In the coming months we are aiming to launch a regular membership survey which will touch on key issues and provide a temperature check amongst students 3-4 times per year. Having this up to date and live information from our membership can only help us support you more effectively when relaying issues to stakeholders, both inside and external to the University environment.

We also are committed to continuing to support you and this year in the first semester alone our Advice service supported almost 250 student cases.





Such a service is critical in providing students with an external body that can support you with issues to improve or safeguard your university experience. We continue to look at ways to grow this service to support as many students as possible.

Despite the need to represent the membership, our student members are also at university for the wider experience and as such offering ways to connect with others and build life-long friendships is another core aim of the Union. Through our campaigns, events, and volunteering programmes we continue to build an eclectic mix of opportunities for our members to engage with one another. We remain mindful that our membership is diverse and preferences around engagement can vary so we continue to offer both traditional and digital ways to connect. The growth in digital preferences is clear with our Instagram following growing by 50% and the breath of our reach on the same platform increasing by around 120%. We are proud of this growth and will continue to offer a variety of ways for our membership to connect with one another into 2025-26.

We are looking forward to working on current and fresh priorities over the forthcoming year, with the aim of each to improve the experience of our membership. We will continue to offer more opportunities to engage and connect directly with us and are looking forward to representing the needs of the student body into the next year.

Lifestyle Hubs

Led by our Campus VPs we have successfully lobbied the University for Lifestyle Hubs/ Pantries on each campus. This is a space where students can pick up foodstuffs, kitchenette goods or cleaning products that would typically impact a student's weekly budget. The student cohort has warmly received this and we're glad to see thousands of students benefit from this already.

Charter Tackling Violence Against Women & Girls

In March, we launched our Charter Tackling Violence Against Women & Girls. Led by our VP for Education, the enormously well-attended event was a landmark student event in the struggle to end violence against women and girls. Much more importantly, it gives UUSU the template and guidance to continue campaigning to end this disgraceful violence.



Magee Taskforce

As Magee grows from 5,000 to 10,000 students, your Union has been front and centre of the expansion. We have spent the year working proactively with students to identify key areas of concern for current students. We've raised issues that students have flagged, from car parking to student accommodation, and we have made those concerns a central priority of the Taskforce.

Anti-Spiking Campaign

The ongoing spiking epidemic has left students in Northern Ireland less safe and more anxious about enjoying one of the key elements of the university experience: nights out. UUSU has worked collaboratively with the Justice Ministry to lobby for anti-spiking legislation to be introduced. Additionally, through lobbying of local councils, additional anti-spiking materials were provided to students during Freshers and Club/ Society Nights out. We're here to Represent Support and Connect you while you are studying at UU. This year we have been working tirelessly for positive change for all our students and creating spaces for students to engage and get involved.

'Don't Increase Our Fees!'

Our rees:

Thanks to student pressure and serious lobbying from the Students' Union working alongside the national students' union NUS-USI - we've successfully stopped a proposed tuition fee rise of £1,000 more per year.

In May 2025 the VC of Queen's University, Ulster University and The Open University wrote to political party leaders across the Northern Ireland. In the letter they called for a rise in undergraduate fees to £5,831 per year. They argued that the current funding model for HE is 'unstainable' and that this can be fixed by charging students more.

UUSU lobbied that putting the burden of a broken university system on students was not the answer. The result has been that Northern Ireland's economy minister has said she will not be increasing university tuition fees above the usual level of inflation.

Caoimhe Archibald said while she recognised the challenges facing universities, she did not wish to "push that additional pressure on to students".

Check out UUSU's actions on UU Students' Basic Needs

At UUSU we believe that students need to have their student basic needs met before they can thrive at UU. Students' basic needs include food security, housing, health & wellbeing support, financial stability and personal safety. Being a student is about thriving rather than surviving.

> Being a student is about thriving rather than surviving.

Students Basic Needs:

Food security: Access to nutritious and sufficient food

Housing: Safe, stable, and affordable accommodation

Health & wellbeing support: Availability of medical and mental health services

Financial stability: Resources to manage expenses and avoid financial stress

Personal safety: A secure environment free from harm and discrimination

For too many our students, these essentials – that in the past were taken for granted, today have become a luxury for many of our students.

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Food Security

This doesn't exist separately from housing precarity or financial stress – these needs are interconnected challenges. We lobbied the University to provide the recently launched Lifestyle Hub offers non-perishable items, stationery, and hygiene products to all students facing food insecurity. We have continued the initiative whereby we collect pre packed sandwiches with a short shelf life from on campus catering and store them in Food Bank branded fridges within the Students' Union. The sandwiches are still within date and help greatly with students struggling to make ends meet. Not only does the initiative help students in hardship but also helps sustainability on campus.

Financial Assistance

Our Advice Bureau encourages students to access various financial support systems including grants, bursaries, and financial assistance funds to help with tuition fees, living expenses, and unexpected costs.

Community Building

We run Freshers, Halloween, Christmas, Refreshers ϑ Campaign events. We ensure our SU spaces across our campuses are safe and inclusive, promoting a culture of respect and support. We want our students to know students' voices are heard and their needs are met, and they know that we're here for them.

Housing

We launched our renters' rights leaflets with checklists for students to take with them to their house viewings. We understand that poor living conditions for students means poor grades and promoting in the first semester the NUS-USI petition calling for homes fit for students.

In October we held our course reps and student council elections. The election of the student council is particularly important time of the year for UUSU because of the central role of Student Council in reflecting the views of our membership through the creation of UUSU policies.

This year we've had a fantastic level of academic representation with over 800 students taking up the course, school, and faculty rep roles. These students have dedicated over 24,000 hours to their roles, which is fantastic. In March we held our leadership elections for the 2025-6 academic year. We had the highest ever turn out for our online elections. 16,859 votes cast! Your full-time student officers, faculty and school reps were also elected by you for the forthcoming academic year.

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Student Voice Coordinators

We were delighted to welcome two new Student Voice Co-ordinators in Semester Charlotte Doak focuses on Engagement and Paul Frazer works on Academic Representation.

Paul is a former Lecturer in English Literature (Northumbria University) with a background in learning support and postgraduate academic skills training. As Student Voice Coordinator (Academic Representation) Paul will oversee and support the largest group of student volunteers at Ulster University. They will ensure the collective opinion of students is heard across their learning experience through an established student voice structure managed by Ulster University Students' Union (UUSU).



Some of the UU community might recognise Charlotte as a former part time employee with the Students' Union. Charlotte's Student Voice Coordinator (Engagement) role will be centred on our membership and engagement through listening, evidencing and tracking collective student feedback which will drive UUSU strategic direction, actions, policy, stakeholder feedback, and campaigns. The role will lead and coordinate the official. collective UUSU representation structure for student sport at Ulster University. It will also drive and inspire UUSU student and researcher community networks, providing stronger links with their Students' Union and an additional level of support for our diverse student membership.





Student Council

This year Student's Council has been hard at work, making important changes to so many of our policies that we have held on our books!

From changes to our Identity Policy and our work around Pronouns and acceptance of all of our students to our support for breastfeeding students ensuring that no one is left behind.

Our Student Council has once again been scrutinising our Officer's, holding them to account over four quorate Student Council meetings throughout the year. Alongside making sure our organisation remains fit for purpose through changes to our Bye-Laws and governance. This year our members of Student Council have represented



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our students in University Senate to a greater extent than ever before, ensuring that the all-important views of postgraduate students and our international student community are heard at the highest level.

We look forward to seeing what comes next from our highest level Student-led body in UUSU. UUSU Survey

We want our members to be at the heart of our work and to tell us how they want to engage with UUSU and what they think our priorities should be.

Our end of year survey has just closed with over 1,254 respondents completing the survey. We will use the survey data to ensure our students' voices are heard in shaping our future work.

National Student Conferences

We hosted elections to select students to attend the AMLÉ – Aontas na Mac Léinn in Éirinn and NUS-USI conferences. Several years ago, there was a review into student sport which recommended that the governance of student sport move from the Students' Union across to the University. The governance of most student sport sits within the University rather than the Students' Union in most UK universities.

However, the Students' Union still represent and supports the clubs via our VP Sport & Wellbeing and our Student Voice Coordinator Engagement. UUSU conducted a sports survey at the start of the academic year asking students about the support they received from the Students' Union and the University regarding sports. The survey responses reflected a good campus balance and the views of fourteen different clubs. 80% of respondents wanted to give feedback to UUSU.

The main action from the survey is to establish Online Drop in Forums for each semester to gather club feedback to represent and support the clubs.

The main concerns from sports clubs are lack of funding which could in the future stop the clubs fulfilling their fixtures, buying sports equipment and/or being able to pay for enough coaching hours.



Learning & Teaching Awards

Congratulations to those recognised at the recent UUSU Learning & **Teaching Awards!** This year marked the 10th Anniversary of the Awards. It was a fantastic evening at the Ebrington Hotel, Derry~Londonderry celebrating our outstanding staff and academic reps supporting the student journey at UU.

Many thanks to our student and PGR shortlisting panel. With over 575 submissions across categories this was no easy task. What makes these awards stand out is they are completely student-led, organised, and managed through UUSU. Nominations come from students. with staff only eligible to submit in the Academic Rep category.

We received over 570 nominations this year showing the impact of hundreds of individual staff members, teams and reps. The judging and shortlisting panel was made up of student reps from across Faculties and the Doctoral College. Thanks to all the students and staff who made nominations and to our student shortlisting panel.

Kidz Farm on campus helped destress students around assignments and exam time. We also support the National Student Campaigns throughout the year which effect the general student body.

Our small team of experienced advisors deal with cases & enquiries across all Ulster University Campuses. Main issues remain Academic Appeals & Course Matters, Housing & Tenancy issues, Cost of Living, Student Finance & Fees, International Student issues & University Complaints. Noted growth of disciplinaries and plagiarism/academic integrity cases.

- Relevant networking meetings & links have also taken place with AB Staff/ UUSU Officers and UU Fees Dept, UU International & Global Affairs UU Student Academic Affairs Team & UU Student Administration & Neuro Network Training & Events.
- Development of cases θ key working relationships with UU School of Medicine-Professors Harris and Debras and UU Doctoral college.
- During this reporting period UUSU Advice involvement wider membership in University Working groups including Leave of Absence policy review group, Academic Integrity, Consumer Protection group, Belfast Student Housing Coop & Advice NI Quarterly Managers group.

Through the Students' Union intervention we secured a University Early Exam board in December 2024 which saved 28 UU Business School student a Visa Extension & NHS Healthcare surcharge of approx. £700-£800 per person.

Through lobbying we secured a commitment from Naomi Long as Minister for Justice that when stand-alone anti-spiking legislation is passed in Westminster, she will bring a motion to Stormont to adopt the law here.

Thank you to Northwest Migrants Forum for holding these important awards and recognising the groups and individuals working to advance race equality.












Womens Charter

Tackling violence against women and girls in Northern Ireland: A students' union response.



These issues are impacting the wider community and so, we have posed a collective response based on our collective responsibility to address this serious problem.

In March UUSU came together to sign the Women's Charter, representing a commitment to action. This is a commitment to societal change, a commitment to our fight to end violence against women and girls.

UUSU were joined by local politicians Claire Hanna (MP), Diana Armstrong (MLA) and Connie Egan (MLA) who answered questions from our attendees and student members, recognising the need for change at all levels.

In the next few months the charter will be adopted by other Students' Union in Ireland rolled out by AMLÉ – Aontas na Mac Léinn in Éirinn.



UUSU attended Reclaim the Night Belfast & Foyle as well as the Pink Walk with Walkie Talkie Girlies in Belfast & the Rally for Women's Safety in Derry/Londonderry. We have been committed this year to standing up against gender based violence.







Key Principles

- **1.** Students' Unions will stand up and speak out on incidences of violence against women and girls. We will take responsibility for calling it out both as individual representatives and as organisations.
- **2.** Students' Unions will develop policies and practices that highlight and address the ongoing issues of Violence Against Women and Girls, discrimination, and inequality, ensuring such policies have achievable actions on how to combat these issues on their campuses.
- **3.** Students' Unions will take steps to actively involve women and girls in all aspects of Union life, from securing leadership roles, to holding council seats, to becoming academic reps, and being involved in societies/networks.
- **4.** Students' Unions will work to establish active bystander training schemes/programmes for all universities and colleges across Northern Ireland.
- **5.** Through education, campaigns, and other work Students' Unions will strive to reduce stereotypes, stigma and barriers for women and girls in Northern Ireland.













Lighthouse Project Magee Campus

The Lighthouse Project is a collaboration between Foyle Search and Rescue and Danny Quigley which provides a central database of support services in the Derry city and district. The support services are advertised on their website: https://lighthouse.foylesearchandrescue.com/

Yellow stickers tapped by mobiles take the user straight to the website database. Connor O'Hagan, VP Sport & Welfare has been working with Foyle and Rescue to get these stickers installed throughout the Magee campus.

The promotional stickers have been installed in all Magee restrooms, changing rooms, library and noticeboards. Stickers will also soon be installed in the Duncreggan Student Village Accommodation. The Foyle & Rescue Service had an awareness stall at the Refreshers Fayre to promote the Lighthouse Project to students and to recruit student volunteers. Dawn from Foyle & Rescue Service also set up with student officers at Brew Monday in February to increase awareness among students of the support service.

The Foyle and Rescue's up and coming promotional video will be promoted by the Students' Union website and socials. Connor O'Hagan has also begun implementing the Lighthouse Project on the Coleraine campus. The plan is that the incoming VP Sport & Welfare will implement on the Belfast campus during the 2025-6 academic year. In September the Lighthouse Project will also be promoted by the incoming officers to the new Freshers cohort.



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Mission Christmas


