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Campaigns



Sustainability

Sustainability is an important area of work for UUSU. We work closely with the University, NUS/USI and SOS-UK (Students Organising for Sustainability) on all aspects of sustainability.



Equality, Diversity and Inclusion

Equality, diversity, and inclusion has been at the centre of the work carried out at UUSU. We aim to celebrate the rich diversity of the student population at Ulster, while encouraging awareness and understanding of the issues that may be faced by students from such a wide range of backgrounds.



UOK? We're here for You

This year we delivered a major UOK? mental health and wellbeing campaign which included an inbound & outbound phoneline to assess student needs, which was then complimented by wellbeing events & digital campaigns. We also held a student mental health summit, activated mindfulness areas on campus including the provision of wellbeing packs for students as well as creating a suite of 'UUSU Meets...' mental health student videos for future use.

Net Zero Challenge

UUSU partnered with the university in rolling out the Net Zero Challenge which incentivised and encouraged staff and students to improve their carbon footprint through daily challenges and rewards.



Green Week

This included securing £800 in funding for the union's Green Week campaign which allowed 10 of our student-led societies to run climate-themed events, contributing to the wider programme.

Engaging with further stakeholders created an immersive experience, including on-campus caterers going meat-free and launching keepcup initiates, and external charity 'Sustrans' also hosting events.

Wellbeing Garden

Created a community allotment on-campus for students in Magee to get some headspace, and get access to locally grown, organic, produce. Hosted a variety of events to create community and find out more about how we connect with the natural world (e.g., foraging trips and organic farm visits). Work is in progress to develop and put in place a similar provision in both Coleraine and Belfast.

Green Impact

Green Impact is a United Nations award-winning programme designed to support environmentally and socially sustainable. It suggests what people can do in their workplace to make a difference and guides them how to do this in an accessible but meaningful way, creating a widespread culture of sustainability.

UUSU completed its Green Impact Audit and we are aspiring to receive a good/very good commendation at the beginning of July.









Equality, Diversity and Inclusion

Creation of VP Equality and Belonging

With the significant reduction in teaching taking place in Jordanstown in 2022-23, Student Council agreed that this would be an appropriate stage to consider dissolving the VP Jordanstown Officer role. In light of this decision, the Student Executive endeavoured to explore options for a suitable replacement. There had been an extensive consultation process with the student body in recent years which had highlighted the need for a Student Officer whose role would focus on EDI issues.

With this in mind therefore, a proposal was brought to Student Council, detailing the need for a VP Equality and Belonging. Student Council unanimously voted to accept this proposal and we are excited to see the new VP Equality and Belonging take up post from 1st July 2022.

This officer will have a diverse and wide-ranging area of work which includes supporting student communities and networks. These include but are not exclusive to BME, women's, LGBT+, mature, parttime, minority languages, students with disabilities, neurodivergent students and those with parent and caring responsibilities.

Student Council Structure

Currently, there are two equality seats per campus on Student Council. Nominees for these seats should self-define as being a member of one of the following groups: International Students; LGBT; BAME: Disabled; Minority Languages and or a member of a Faith Group. This is to help encourage more engagement and visibility from under represented groups, to help influence policy and activity. Equality Councillors amplify the voices of the entire UUSU membership, to encourage all voices to the table.

Equality, diversity and inclusion has been integral to the work of the Students' Union, aiming to celebrate the students from minority groups, but also educating those who aren't aware of the obstacles that students from diverse backgrounds face.

The Councillors have worked with students from minority backgrounds across all four campuses providing support and advocating for meaningful change.



Equality, Diversity and Inclusion

Period Poverty Pilot Scheme

This year, UUSU were able to roll out the pilot scheme to help tackle the growing issue of period poverty. This scheme saw the provision of free period products in an inclusive and accessible manner that helps to combat period stigma. The scheme was funded by the Department for Education and was implemented in the gender-neutral bathrooms located in the Students' Union spaces on each campus.

The location of the products in gender-neutral spaces was particularly important in order to ensure accessibility, allowing any student or member of staff to avail of the products as necessary.

Support for Breastfeeding Students Policy

During the 2021/2022 academic year, the UUSU Student Council 'Support for Breastfeeding Students' policy was progressed. It was fantastic that the university joined the Breastfeeding Welcome Here Scheme in 2021, and we wanted to continue their efforts by reaching out to the Northern Health and Social Care Trust to procure more awareness stickers for our campuses. You will now be able to find more stickers in popular social spaces on campus, a reminder to students about the scheme and the inclusivity of our spaces.

- Provided an outbound hotline (in conjunction with Advice NI) which contacted students over 4 weeks during November/December to understand the potential impacts of students being back on campus.
- UOK campaign provided key signposts, support networks & resources for students.
- Redesign of our web services, to better focus on student support.
- Contributed to the UU 'Mind your Mood' project.
- Investment in online training and reporting platform to reassure students that consent & sexual violence is priority issue closely aligned to strong mental wellbeing.
- Developed mindfulness spaces & held events in spaces.
- Ran mindfulness campaigns and provided wellness packs & resources.

- Significant increase on the ground engagement using student staff for Freshers Fortnight.

- UUSU Meets....' videos feature four student relatable figures in the public eye who have had to look after their own mental wellbeing. These are frank and honest assessment pieces of how mental health can impact anyone and how it has been managed or overcome.

Represent

- Digital campaigns for Parent Mental Health Day, University Mental Health Day, Stress Awareness Month and Mental Health Awareness Week.
- Students were supported digitally during Stress Awareness Month by a series of information posts acknowledging, how stress can manifest itself; how phone use can impact stress levels; how we can manage our stress by performing activities and Top Tips to Reduce Stress Levels.
- Student summit held to plan and strategise on student future needs. Staff and students on the Student Mental Health Committee will now create an action plan so students' mental health and wellbeing is at the centre of everything that UUSU does. This will inform a update of the Mental Health Action Plan and focus on interventions and the potential lobbying of external stakeholders to better support the wellbeing needs of young people across NI.







UUSU is constantly looking to improve the student experience at Ulster through providing opportunities to represent, support and connect our members. Here are just a small selections of some of our wins across the last academic year.









We have successfully navigated the intensive pandemic period and were delighted to welcome members back to campus in September 2021.

We have ensured the balance for members to have a face-to-face experience whilst ensuring a high degree of safety on campus is in place through our work as part of numerous groups across the University.



We are expanding our support for students and looking to access funding to recruit extra resources for 2022-23.













We worked with the university to ensure 12,000 alumni students had access to an in-person graduation.

We ensured that a price freeze on graduation costs was in place to cover the backlog of graduations to keep the promise of profit free graduation.



We helped to secure 4,000 free travelcards for Belfast students who had to relocate to Jordanstown for Semester 1 & 2.













Our UUSU Advice Bureau has been on hand to provide support and guidance and has seen a significant increase in offering support around student health and wellbeing.

We facilitated the setup of 16 new Societies in this academic year.

We amplified your Voice with a growth in our representative structure with 678 academic reps in place, an increase of 114 reps on 2021/22.















We put Student Sport back to prepandemic levels and have around 1600 club memberships and no restrictions remain in place to access sport.

We made sure you are represented through Student Council with 100% of the seats filled, giving members an active voice.

We relaunched a bigger and better award programme with the SEAs, LTAs and Colours all running successful in person events in 2022.











We continue to offer quality space on campus and have successfully lobbied for the sale of alcohol in Magee and Belfast.

We successfully set-up and provided to Magee students a wellbeing garden space which has yielded its first harvest.

Our voice transcends the University walls and we have worked with other unions across Ireland and the UK to pass policy, debate important issues and make real change for students, including securing a long-term intervention for period poverty in Northern Ireland
